WORKSHOP: INTRODUCTION TO DISABILITY ACCESS

Meg Riley and Bec Young, Access2Arts

Description: Access2Arts fosters an inclusive community that develops, embraces and celebrates the unique talents, skills and perspectives of people who are d/Deaf or disabled. In this Introduction to Disability Access workshop, Access2Arts staff will explore what disability is, what access is, and what you can do to make your work more accessible. It's an opportunity to ask frank questions, learn about terminology, and learn more about the exciting and creative disability community.

KEYNOTE: DIGITAL COMMUNITIES, NETWORKED LIVES

Description: How can museums make their collections of digital content accessible to disabled audiences? Curator of Digital Design at London's V&A, Natalie Kane, will share knowledge from the V&A's history of collecting digital design to see where the challenges and opportunities lie. Complex digital objects are fraught with obsolescence and instability, so how do we capture the multiple networked experiences of disabled people and communities and their interactions with design? From Instagram accounts sharing reuse and adaptation tips, to app creators and creative social media campaigns, this enlightening presentation will challenge your ideas of what accessibility can be in a museum context.

PANEL: BECOMING ACCESSIBLE
